The Danish Society has shifted from Parnell to a new purpose-built premises in in-dustrial Penrose.

The almost \$1.5 million site and building was officially opened last Sunday with the

help of the Australasian Danish ambassador based in Canberra.

Co-project manager Bjarne Co-project manager Bjarne Elowsson says the new site, with its 700sq m building, was badly needed to accommodate the growing society's 400 members.

The society also wanted a
